


## YOUNG PROFESSIONAL FELLOWSHIP 2025 Jeongia

### **Event Report**



### **Event Summary**

In the historically rich and layered city of Tbilisi, over 50 young leaders from more than 20 nations came together for the Young Professional Fellowship Georgia 2025. The program blended intellectual discourse with immersive cultural engagement, offering high-impact expert sessions on global governance, leadership, diplomacy, sustainability, and innovation. Interactive workshops sharpened critical thinking, strategic problem-solving, and collaborative project design. Cultural exchange activities brought global heritage, traditions, and artistry to life for participants. Diplomatic panel talks connected youth with seasoned professionals, bridging generational and ideological perspectives. Experiential learning exercises encouraged crosscultural understanding and real-world leadership application.

Moreover, networking sessions built enduring professional and personal bonds. Creative group projects highlighted the delegates' ingenuity and dedication to global causes. Overall, the fellowship expanded knowledge while deepening empathy for diverse narratives. Tbilisi, with its timeless charm, became both a classroom and a catalyst for meaningful change among the participants.

### Fellowship Aims

- To equip young leaders with actionable knowledge on diplomacy, peacebuilding, and sustainable governance through engaging expert-led sessions.
- To develop leadership skills via immersive simulations, critical discussions, and collaborative problem-solving exercises.
- To promote cross-cultural understanding by facilitating dialogue, cultural showcases, and the exchange of impactful ideas.

Day 1

The Young Professional Fellowship Georgia 2025 began amidst the living history of Old Tbilisi, a beginning as vibrant as the city itself. The day commenced at the Tbilisi Marriott Hotel, where initial introductions quickly gave way to genuine conversations. Delegates soon ventured into the city's heart, greeted by the intense Georgian weather. The narrow cobblestone streets, colorful facades, and the mingling scents of fresh fruit and spices created an immediate sensory immersion.



As the group explored, Georgian delegates stepped into the role of informal guides, sharing stories and local insights. A stop at the iconic leaning clock tower led to an impromptu moment where several delegates from Japan participated in a lighthearted Tbilisi tradition, having their photographs printed in a vintage newspaper style. The simple gesture carried a charm that sparked delight among the group

The tour continued to Narikala Fortress, offering panoramic views of the city: the Metekhi Church poised dramatically on a cliff, the Mtkvari River landscape. Nearby, the Mother of Georgia (Kartlis Deda) stood as a powerful emblem of the nation's hospitality and resilience. Crossing the modern glass-and-steel Bridge of Peace, linking the old with the new, felt emblematic of the fellowship's purpose, bringing together diverse perspectives while honoring tradition.

Along the way, delegates paused for ice cream, exchanged stories, captured photographs, and even witnessed a Georgian wedding procession, a vivid reminder that the city's culture is as alive in its streets as in its monuments. Despite the heat and the day's long walk, spirits remained high, with smiles and animated conversations marking each stop.

Though framed as a city tour, the day's true significance lay in the connections formed, shared experiences that built familiarity, trust, and a sense of common purpose. It was an opening chapter that blended the beauty of Georgia with the spirit of global unity, setting the tone for the days ahead.









The second day of the Young Professional Fellowship Georgia 2025 commenced with a spirited Welcome Ceremony, setting an atmosphere

of cultural vibrancy and engagement.

Georgian musicians delivered a live performance blending Spanish and Turkish melodies, heir rhythmic harmonies enlivening he hall. The soloist's emotive voice resonated with the audience, creating an immediate cultural connection that transcended language barriers. This was a moment of cross-cultural dialogue through music.



Following the ceremony, the Orientation Session provided a

Young Professional Fellowship's
mission, history, and achievements,
with particular emphasis on youth
empowerment and the legacy of past
events. Opening Remarks were then
delivered by Mr. Muhammad Ahmed,
Vice Chairman of YPF, who underscored
the fellowship's emphasis on participation,
action, and leadership. His address
positioned the day's agenda as an active
journey rather than a passive observation



The **Ice-Breaking Session** enabled delegates from diverse nations to introduce themselves, share unique aspects of their cultures, and establish a sense of familiarity. This exchange of backgrounds and experiences encouraged both cultural appreciation and the beginnings of meaningful connections.



The first thematic session, "Youth and Career Mapping: Finding Purpose in a Technology-Driven World", was co-facilitated by Ms. Nino Gogokhia and Ms. Ana Mindiashvili. With a blend of personal narrative and actionable insight, they encouraged delegates to embrace career transitions, view creative hobbies as potential professional assets, and strategically position themselves in competitive job markets. Practical advice ranged from résumé refinement and strategic keyword usage to interview presentation and

leveraging professional networks such as LinkedIn. The discussion explored self-awareness, life balance through the "Wheel of Life" framework, and the disciplined art of declining commitments as an act of self-respect. One notable sentiment, "Rejection isn't the end; sometimes it is redirection,"



encapsulated the session's forward-looking tone. Ms. Gogokhia's metaphor of "jumping into hot water" further reinforced the necessity of risk-taking and adaptability in professional growth. A **Group Activity** followed, in which delegates were divided into small teams to identify personal skills, share strategies for mastering them, and consolidate these into a collective resource for the wider group. This exercise facilitated skill exchange and highlighted the diversity of expertise within the cohort. After a **lunch break**, which provided additional opportunities for informal networking, the YPF team conducted **Delegate Interviews**, capturing participants' reflections on their fellowship experience thus far.







The afternoon featured a thought-provoking session led by

Prof. Dr. Nino Kekelidze on "Women in Leadership: Can Gender Equality Ensure Ethical Governance?"

Drawing on empirical research and regional case studies, Dr. Kekelidze initiated a dialogue on equitable power structures, representation, and ethical decision-making. The conversation extended into he balance between professional achievement and personal fulfilment, with reflections on public figures such as Steve Jobs offering compelling perspectives on the multifaceted nature of success.



A brief Coffee Break preceded the Team Challenge,

one of the day's most engaging segments. Delegates collaborated to conceptualize youth-led organizations, articulating their missions, values, and strategic priorities. Teams designed conceptual youth-led organizations addressing a range of global and local issues. One example was "EduRise", an NGO model aimed at bridging educational disparities between rural and urban communities. Proposed values included equity, inclusion, accessibility, diversity, and collaboration, supported by initiatives such as affordable education,

educator training, multilingual learning resources, and community-based workshops. Logos and mottos were crafted to visually represent each organization's mission, for instance, EduRise adopted a candle illuminating a bridge as a symbol of hope, guidance, and connection. The activity generated rich cross-cultural dialogue, with delegates exchanging insights on challenges in their respective regions and identifying shared approaches to long-term impact.









The day concluded with a Closing Segment and a Group Photograph, a symbolic capture of the unity, leadership, and shared vision cultivated throughout the day.



# Day 3

The final day of the Young Professional Fellowship Georgia 2025 began with the

arrival of delegates in vibrant cultural attire, infusing the venue with a rich display of traditions and global heritage. The Welcome Ceremony featured a deeply moving performance by Korean musician Sherwin, who shared his personal experiences of racism and his determination to combat discrimination against Asian communities. Through heartfelt songs such as I Am Yours and a Taylor Swift cover, he intertwined activism and artistry, leaving a lasting impression of courage and hope.



OWSHIP GEORGIA 2024



An Opening Speech by Ms. Ani Samadashvili, Global Peace Ambassador, urged the delegates to embrace their roles as changemakers within their own communities, setting a purposeful tone for the day.

The first session, "Youth and Climate Change: How can Youth use Crowdsourced Policy Proposals and Digital Advocacy to Shape Climate Action?" was led by Ms. Elene Jguburia. Delegates examined he ntersection of technology, advocacy, and policy

making, discussing how digital platforms can amplify youth voices, encourage accountability, and generate grassroots solutions. The conversation touched on practical and relatable issues, from the environmental costs of fast fashion to the

government's response to the Racha tragedy, as well as examples of international good practice such as Germany's bottle-return system, the expansion of electric vehicles, and innovative digital tools linking consumer purchases to social impact.

The morning continued with a Youth Challenge Group Activity, in which teams were assigned real-life youth-related challenges, such as online bullying, gender-based discrimination, and exclusion due to financial limitations. Within thirty minutes, each group developed three actionable responses. Proposed

solutions included mentorship programs, peer support networks, inclusive budgeting models, and mental health advocacy. The exercise encouraged delegates to think critically, act empathetically, and connect their problem-solving approaches to immediate and tangible impact











After a networking Lunch Break and a round of Delegate Interviews, the program resumed with "Global Solidarity in Crisis: Can Citi zen-Led Aid Complement Governments' Efforts?" by Ms. Nino Margvelashvili. This session examined how citizen-driven initiatives can bridge gaps left by government responses in times of crisis, whether during pandemics, natural disasters, or large-scale displacement.

Delegates explored the balance between civic action and institutional policy, as well as the potential of grassroots movements to catalyze systemic change. The session also featured a meditative empathy exercise, where participants

practiced active listening without responding. This simple exercise proved unexpectedly powerful, allowing individuals to feel acknowledged without judgment or unsolicited advice

In the Social Project Presentations, delegates showcased their innovative social impact projects, including a spirited talk on women in leadership, GAT (Give and Take)-a digital initiative enabling people to share surplus clothing or food with others in need through location-based connectivity and others.









The final speaker, Ms. Tamta Tskhovrebadz, delivered "Towards Global Citizenship: Inspire a Shared Vision to Become an Exemplary Leader", introducing the Kuramoto model as a metaphor for unity through diversity. Just as differing rhythms can eventually align without losing their individuality, the session demonstrated that global leadership thrives when differences are embraced rather than erased.







The program concluded with a **Parade of Cultures**, where delegates proudly carried their **National flags and wore traditional dresses**,



Followed by the **Awarding Ceremony**. Speakers received **honorary awards**, while each delegate was presented with a certificate and branded gifts, including a pen, notebook, t-shirt, and other mementos.



The day ended with **group photographs**, exchange of contacts, and farewells filled with mutual respect and warmth



### Conclusion

The Young Professional Fellowship Georgia 2025 concluded as a shared space of dialogue, cultural exchange, and purposeful collaboration.

Across three days, delegates confronted pressing global issues, exchanged innovative solutions, and strengthened their capacity to lead with integrity. As the program ended, it was clear that its impact would endure, carried forward by each delegate into their communities and future endeavors.
